1 Course Description

The primary activity in this course is a independent study and preparation of a senior thesis under faculty supervision. This course is the second in a two quarter sequence. Students will utilize the skills they have acquired in the previous quarter and the major to complete their own original research project. Major components of the course implementing a unique research design, presenting research findings in a professional setting, and writing a final, comprehensive paper. In course meetings, students will meet to discuss their progress but a large portion of this work is independent. As part of the course, students are expected to meet with the professor and other faculty members in advisement of their projects.

2 The Thesis Project

Each student is to develop a 30-40 page research paper that focuses on a specific aspect of political science. The project should adopt the perspective of at least one of the subfields of political science: American politics, international relations, comparative politics, political theory, public law, public administration, or political methodology. The student should ideally have completed all 200-level courses and at least three upper division courses in a single subfield. Students should have already selected a topic, research question, and hypotheses. Research design and implementation is the central focus of this course and significant time should be devoted to it.

The grade in this class is largely based on your final thesis. Other requirements are spread out over additional assignments designed to keep you on task. Please see Section

4 for how these requirements will be used to calculate your final grade.

As previously stated, the thesis project is designed to give you a chance to demonstrate your competence in the following skills and abilities. In this quarter, the course is primarily dedicated to the latter half of this list:

1. Develop a research topic within one of the subfields of political science.
2. Design a research project in accordance with the principles of sound research methodology quantitative, qualitative, legal, or theoretical.
3. Apply knowledge and modes of analysis from one of the subfields of political science to the understanding of a current political issue.
4. Conduct library research.
5. Identify appropriate data sources and know how to use the data effectively in support of an argument.
6. Write clearly and persuasively in a technically competent manner.
7. Critique the writing of others.
8. Make an effective oral presentation on a political science topic.

3 Required Text

The readings for this course are to be found in the Fall quarter online reader. No new readings are assigned for this quarter.

4 Course Requirements

At the end of winter, the final thesis is graded anonymously by another member of the political science faculty and myself. We grade thesis projects according to criteria that you will be provided in advance. The average of those two grades will determine your grade on the project itself.

For the Winter quarter, your grade will be calculated using the following guidelines:

Percentage	Assignment
10%	<i>Attendance:</i> There are only three required meetings throughout the quarter. These meetings are during Week 1 (W 1/4), 7 (2/13), and 10 (3/6).
10%	<i>Advisement:</i> I strongly encourage you to attend office hours for one-on-one conversations about your progress. I am not mandating regular office hours visits, but I expect you to actively seek help on your respective projects.
15%	<p><i>Conference Presentation:</i> The conference presentation will be graded on a number of different criteria by the faculty attendees. The Senior Conference is scheduled for Friday, February 24. Although you do not have to attend the entire day, the schedule will not be published until the middle of the quarter. Please clear your schedules for this day.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Failure to present at the Senior Conference results in an automatic fail. Students who fail cannot graduate in June and must repeat this course next year.
65%	<p><i>Thesis:</i> The thesis is graded based on a rubric that will be provided to you. You will be assigned an anonymous faculty member to grade your thesis. Their grade will be averaged with my own to determine this portion of your grade.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Each student must turn in two hard copies of the thesis. The thesis must follow the appropriate format and be velo binded at Copy & Mail in the Bronco Student Center. You must also turn in a digital copy on Blackboard.

5 Extra Credit

I am offering two opportunities for extra credit. The first is at the Cal Poly Pomona Student Research Conference. This conference is to be held on **Friday, March 3** in our campus library. The application deadline is on Friday, January 20 (Week 3). At this conference, ten winners are selected from the campus by a panel of faculty judges. You can earn 8 % extra credit toward your final grade for presenting at the conference. The second is presentation practice. Several class meetings during Weeks 7 (W 2/15 & F 2/17), 8 (M 2/20 & W 2/22) are dedicated to optional presentation practice. There are only 20 spots available, but you can sign up at <http://bit.ly/2iwEDHJ>. You can earn 2% extra credit toward your final grade for practicing your presentation.

6 Communication

One of the most rewarding parts of Senior Thesis is developing your projects in one-on-one meetings. It is near impossible to write a thesis without feedback. It is impossible to provide individualized guidance and instruction during our class meetings. By the end of the quarter, I think it is reasonable if students attend office hours at least three times. Office hours are on Mondays and Wednesdays from 12:00pm to 2:00pm. I will be happy to schedule alternate times that may work better with your schedule as I'll be on campus on most other days.

6.1 Class Participation

As an independent study course, there are minimal opportunities to participate in class discussion. Nonetheless, there is an expectation that students will demonstrate a good faith effort in completing the thesis. Procrastinating and waiting until the last possible minute to complete assignments is not a good faith effort. I expect students to demonstrate growth and make a considerable effort in executing their projects. This effort constitutes participation in this course.

6.2 Methods of Communication

Whenever I am in my office (94-316), I am happy to meet with you. I am guaranteed to be in my office during dedicated office hours, but you can also schedule an appointment so we can meet when it is convenient for you.
